

On October 29, Dr. Harry Pruce celebrated his 100th Birthday at Hebrew Health Care's Adult Day Center. Born and raised in Manhattan's Hell's Kitchen, Dr. Pruce studied at Columbia University before attending dentistry school at Marquette University in Wisconsin. With his education complete in 1938, he established a dentistry practice in New York City. Shortly after, he was called to serve in World War II as a Major in the US Air Force in the Medical Corp. After returning home, he married his sweetheart Beverly in December 1940, and had 'two amazing kids,' Marny and Andrew.

He first came to Hebrew Health Care's Adult Day Center in 2002, and later became a resident at the Home in 2007.. He credits his long life to his amazing family and merry life. When asked about HHC he states, "It changed my life for the good; I go to sleep looking forward to the next day."

Chairman's Musings


